Top 3 Causes of Farm Fatalities

According to the National Safety Council, half of all fatalities on farms involve a tractor. The top three causes of farm fatalities are:

- Rollovers
- Runovers
- PTO Entanglements



Tractor Rollover Facts

- About half of all tractor fatalities result from a rollover situation
- Causes of overturns include operating on steep slopes, hitching too high, taking turns quickly, and driving too close to ditches
- The operator of an overturned tractor without a Roll Over Protective Structure (ROPS) and seatbelt has only a 20% chance of survival
- The operator of a ROPS-protected tractor, wearing a seatbelt, is 99% likely to be able to walk away from a tractor rollover
- Around half of farm tractors currently in use don't have a certified ROPS



Rollover Prevention

- Avoid ditches and steep slopes
- Only hitch to the drawbar
- Set wheels wide
- Start moving forward slowly and change speeds smoothly
- Use appropriate speeds
- Slow down for turns
- Use tractors with ROPS and seatbelts



Tractor Runover Facts

- One fourth of farm fatalities result from runovers. Most occur when a passenger falls off
- The highest percentage of runover victims are children riding on a tractor who are 6 years old or younger
- Starting a tractor from anywhere other than the operator's seat bypasses all the safety features that prevent runovers



Runover Prevention

- Keep bystanders and children away from machinery operating areas
- Only start tractors from the operator's seat to prevent bypass start runovers
- Adopt a "no extra riders" policy to eliminate the possibility of passengers falling off the tractor





PTO Entanglement Facts

- Many farm deaths and many lifealtering farm injuries are caused by PTO entanglements
- 87% of all PTO entanglements occur where guards or shields are damaged or missing



PTO Safety Tips

- Keep all shields in place
- Regularly inspect and maintain shields
- Turn off the PTO and tractor's engine before leaving the operator's seat
- Allow time for all components to completely stop rotating before servicing
